

Challenge Statement Regarding Submissions to the Kleros Contract-Domain Name Registry

To Whom It May Concern,

I am challenging recent submissions to the Kleros Contract-Domain Name (CDN) registry that propose the listing of token addresses with domains of decentralized exchanges (DEXs) and bridges. This challenge is an extension of the rationale presented in Case Number 160 (<https://court.kleros.io/cases/160>) and builds upon the arguments made in my previous submissions.

The central concern in these challenges remains consistent: the submissions in question do not demonstrate compliance with the registry's criteria for intentional and specific use of token addresses in conjunction with the submitted domains. Whether associated with a DEX or a bridge, the policy requires clear evidence of intended interaction between the domain and the contract address, beyond mere functionality or presence on these platforms.

For DEX-associated submissions, the capability of trading a token on an exchange does not inherently establish an intentional link with the exchange's domain. Similarly, for bridge-related submissions, the mere functionality of bridging a token does not equate to its intended use from the associated domain. The registry's objective is to catalog contract addresses and domains that have a purposeful, direct relationship, not merely to list platforms where the token is operational.

To preserve the registry's integrity and relevance, it is crucial that only those contract addresses with a demonstrable and intended connection to a specific domain are accepted. These challenges aim to ensure that the Kleros CDN registry continues to serve as a dependable resource for the community, free from ambiguous or unsupported listings.

In light of these considerations and in line with the registry's stated purpose, I recommend that these submissions be carefully reviewed and ultimately not accepted. The appropriate verdict for these challenges, considering the evidence and rationale provided, should be "No, do not add it."
